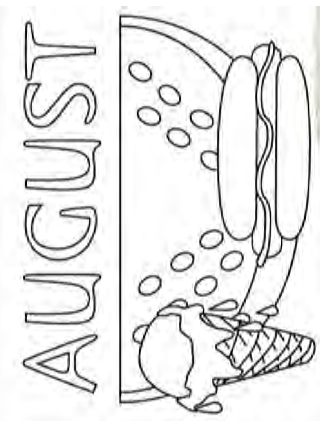

God's Goodness and Transitions



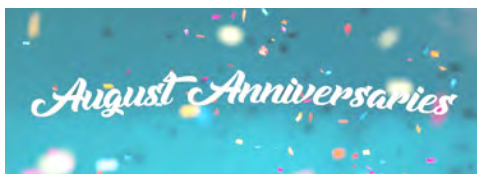

and emotional healing; and they responded to the call to ministry and to plant churches. We seem to understand there is nothing of consequence that will happen in our movement apart from the person and work of the Holy Spirit.

You can count on a gathering rooted in PRAYER.

Every annual conference has dedicated prayer warriors—often wearing shirts or vests—who arrive early to prayer walk the facilities, are present during every session, pray for each speaker before they start, and minister in prayer as people respond to each invitation. We seem to understand our dependence on the Spirit when we seek Him in prayer.

Our annual conference had a day of prayer ministry training the day before it began. **It's not unusual to see people laying hands on and praying for each other** in the hallways, the cafeteria line, or any other setting during the conference. Bishop Webb and I could not enter the plenary hall without several people asking if they could pray for us. This is a great **encouragement, but I also believe it's one reason we see such unity among us** when we gather. When we pray, we give permission for God to fill us once again and do the heart work necessary for us to continue to grow in grace—individually and collectively.

You can count on strong DOCTRINAL TEACHING AND PREACHING.

I believe the formation of the Global Methodist Church has sparked a doctrinal renewal in the Wesleyan, Holiness stream of historic, orthodox Wesleyan Christianity. For decades, those who held our theological perspective seldom had the chance to lead, teach, and preach in annual conferences. That said, God has been at work at the same time raising up solid teachers and preachers—firmly rooted in the Wesleyan, Holiness tradition who have been raised up for such a time as this.

Wherever you go in the Global Methodist movement, you will find bishops who are teaching, guarding and defending our faith; Pastors who preach the entire Gospel (both justification and sanctification) with passion and power; Teachers God has prepared to teach personal evangelism, mission engagement, church planting and multiplication, prayer, etc. with excellence. We are slowly but surely waking up from the doctrinal amnesia of our past and reclaiming the grand deposit we have to offer the Christian movement—our belief in and pursuit of holiness, Christian perfection, and entire sanctification.

When Global Methodists Gather...

"How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity!" (Psalm 133:1)

Dear Friends and Partners in Ministry,

Greetings in the name of Jesus—our Savior and Lord of our past, present and future!

I hope you are enjoying the change of pace summer often brings. It's given me the time for reflection on the goodness and faithfulness of God. During May and June, I took part in four annual conferences in five weeks—Heartland, West Plains, Allegheny West and North Carolina. I write to share some observations, which I hope will be an encouragement to you. God is doing some amazing things in and through the Global Methodist Church.

While each annual conference has its own eco-system which is rooted in its regional culture and experience, there are commonalities that transcend setting and size that have clarified what most have come to expect when **Global Methodists gather to conference. I write to share some of what I've seen with my own eyes and experienced in my heart.**

When Global Methodists gather - You can count on the presence and power of the HOLY SPIRIT.

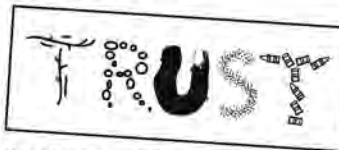
I've heard the Holy Spirit taught, called upon, and acknowledged more in the last two years than in my prior 38 years of conferencing, but it's more than an intellectual ascent. I recently told a friend that each conference (including the General Conference) has seen the multiplying effect of the Spirit—much like a Richter scale doubles with each measurement. I find that the presence of the Spirit seems to magnify every time we gather.

I believe that's because each conference recognizes our utter dependence upon the person and work of the Holy Spirit, and as we call and submit ourselves to the Holy Spirit—the Spirit moves. At this year's conferences, I saw people humbly repent, freed from sin and saved; earnestly desiring holiness, they sought sanctifying grace; they experienced physical, spiritual,

TRUST POSTER

No matter what you face, God is with you. Make this poster as a reminder to always trust God.



What you need:

- Cardstock
- Glue
- Twigs (a 3" piece and a 2" piece)
- Pebbles
- Black paint
- Paintbrush
- Sand or glitter
- Broken crayons (2 or 3)

What you do:

1. On the left side of the cardstock, trace a 3"-high letter T with glue. Place twigs on the glue lines.
2. Trace an R of the same size. Place pebbles on that glue.
3. Use black paint to make a U.
4. Trace an S in glue. Pour sand (or glitter) on top.
5. Make another T with glue. Place the crayons on top.
6. After the poster dries, shake off the excess sand (or glitter) into a trash can.

List of supplies needed:

- One box of 12 colored pencils (leave in box)
- One 2 pocket folder
- One glue stick
- One pair of blunt scissors removed from the package (rounded tip only)
- One 70 page count spiral bound notebook (no loose-leaf or filler paper)
- One 30-centimeter / 12" ruler
- One hand-held pencil sharpener removed from the package
- One large eraser (no pencil cap erasers)
- Six new, unsharpened pencils with erasers (removed from packing and use a rubber band to hold the pencils together)
- One box of 24 crayons (only 24)
- One handmade or store-bought pencil pouch

The Master Puzzler

In *Laughing in the Dark* (Howard Books), Christian comedian Chonda Pierce calls God the Master Puzzler, because “in him all things hold together” (Colossians 1:17). In his infinite wisdom, God “can organize the colors better than anyone (Have you seen a sunset lately?) He knows where to fit every shape and size (Have you seen a mountain range?).”



Until God places the last piece, the final picture is a mystery to us. But in the meantime, God offers order and purpose, providing his law as the puzzle's edges.

Pierce encourages people to let the “Master Puzzler” take over when life gets messy. Like the prophet Jeremiah, we can cry, “GOD, pick up the pieces. Put me back together again. You are my praise!” (17:14, The Message).

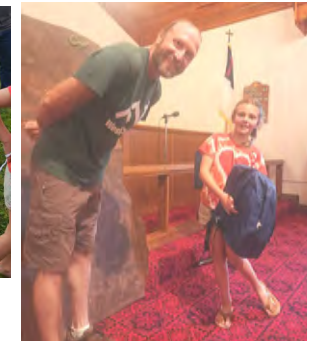

Now, Here is the Rest of the Story

Wesley Missions recently helped a widow from the Garrett area, who was impacted by the recent flooding in her town. The basement area of the home was flooded out, and the water destroyed her furnace, hot water heater and sump pump. The estimated cost to replace these items was about \$4,200, and with a limited income the lady from Garrett did not have the money available to pay for the repairs and replacements.

The lady from Garrett then made an application to FEMA for funding to replace the lost items, but the flooding of the Garrett area did not meet the criteria necessary to qualify for the federal monies, and she was at a loss as to what to do. She scraped together enough money (\$1,000) to initiate a contractor to begin to procure the materials necessary to make the repairs and replace the damaged equipment.

In the meantime Wesley Missions was contacted by a friend of Wesley Chapel Church to inquire about helping the lady from Garrett to resolve her problems. Wesley Missions committee met immediately and voted to take action to assist in getting the contractor (Shaffer Excavating Plumbing and Heating) paid and the bill resolved. The contractor completed the repairs and installations for a total cost of \$3,100. The contractor was able to clean up the combustion chamber liner and reinstall, reducing the cost from the original estimate.

But this incident was only the most recent of the disasters in the life of the lady from Garrett. Her daughter had MS and a couple of years ago, the daughter contracted cancer. The lady from Garrett quit her job to care for her daughter, and the daughter died within several months of the diagnosis of the cancer. The grief of the lady from Garrett did not end **with this tragedy. A few months after her daughter's death, her husband passed away unexpectedly.** This left her financially challenged and with a limited single income.

As can be seen in this glimpse into the life of the lady from Garrett, there may be more to the story than we know. It is the goal of Wesley Missions and that of we Christians at Wesley Chapel Church to always be looking, to be aware and to be responsive to the needs of our neighbors.

Our penny collection for this year will go towards supporting Pastor Francis Mpinganjira's mission at Compassionate Missions Center, located in Malawi, Africa. The grand total for the week was \$430.38, and will be matched by the church. We had an a total of 32 children attend in one evening, with the average attendance of 25 children each night.

A very heartfelt thank you to the church for your support with your prayers, words of encouragement and monetary gifts. May all of what we did this week at Bible school be pleasing to God.

Wilderness Wonders

Wesley Chapel held its annual VBS the week of July 14-18, 2025. The theme this year followed many of God's wonders that took place in the wilderness. Mark Millin directed and prepared this year's wild and wonderful curriculum. A delicious meal was provided for all the children and staff each night.

The first evening's theme was Moses leading the Israelites out of Egypt, the "burning bush," the numerous plagues on the Egyptians, and the parting of the Red Sea which lead to the demise of the Egyptian army. The lesson was taught by Connie Pletcher. *"You were shown these things so that you might know that the Lord is God; besides Him there is no other."* Deuteronomy 4:35

The second evening was lead by Forrest Stark. He dressed the part of Moses and told the children how God provided to the complaining Israelites manna, quail, and water to quench their hunger and thirst. The repeating complaints and rejection of God leaves the people being punished by deadly snakes, which God provides a symbol for them to look upon and be redeemed from their sin. *"Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good; His love endures forever."* Psalm 107:1

Evening three's lesson was given by Tim Latuch, who also dressed up and portrayed John the Baptist coming out of the wilderness. The children learned of John's preparing the way for Christ, teaching others the Word of God, and baptizing people, including Jesus. *"A voice of one calling in the wilderness, prepare the way for the Lord; make straight in the desert a highway for our God."* Isaiah 40:3

The fourth evening's lesson was Jesus overcoming 40 days in the wilderness while being testing by the devil, who was portrayed by Mark Millin. Mark lead the lesson as if telling the story from his perspective. Jesus overcame Satan's deceitful attempts by faith and quoting God's word. *"The time has come! The kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe the good news!"* Mark 1:15

Finally, evening five had Dave Henry summarize all the week's lessons and teaching that all who repent of their sins and follow Jesus will have nothing to fear for God is watching over them and joy will be in their hearts for Jesus will be with
